DISASTER ASSISTANCE - Additional Recovery Measures

QRA is administering a suite of exceptional DRFA assistance measures for recent events.

Southern Queensland Bushfires and Eastern Queensland Bushfires (2019) - \$28.2M

Additional funding under the DRFA has been approved in Queensland in response to the 2020 bushfires. \$28.2M in Category C and D DRFA funding is being made available to assist with the recovery from these bushfires. This includes new packages announced in February of \$1.775M to assist with the clean-up of the

\$1.775M to assist with the clean-up of the Binna Burra Lodge and undertake master planning to inform the Lodge's recovery and restoration needs, and additional \$1.425M top-up payments to five councils under the previously announced Exceptional Assistance Immediate Support Package.

RECOVERY

QRA works extensively on recovery planning with councils impacted by major disaster events, increasing capability and awareness through active participation and providing support for local recovery governance.

Recovery Plans

QRA is currently coordinating three state event specific recovery plans:

Queensland Bushfires (2020)

The Queensland Bushfires Recovery Plan addresses the Southern Queensland Bushfires and Eastern Queensland Bushfires. Functional Recovery Groups have completed recovery action plans which have been incorporated into the Plan. Southern Downs, Noosa, Livingstone, Somerset and Toowoomba Regional Councils have endorsed their event specific local recovery plans. Gladstone, Lockyer Valley and Scenic Rim Regional Councils are being assisted by QRA to develop event specific recovery plans.

North & FNQ Monsoon Trough (2019)

The second quarterly progress report is being progressed through Government for consideration.

Central Queensland Bushfires (2018)

Local Government and State agencies are continuing to support the recovery objectives outlined in the recovery plan. Flexible funding grants have enabled Council to use innovative approaches to recovery including the development of Rural Community Connect in the Central Highlands and an art education program in Mackay. The third progress report is currently progressing through Government for consideration.



Recovery Planning and Governance Project

As a result of the 2018-19 disaster season, assisting local governments with developing and/or strengthening local disaster recovery capabilities has been identified as a key recovery priority for Queensland.



Queensland Recovery Project

A revised Queensland Recovery Plan has been provided to State Government Functional Recovery Groups for input. The revised plan captures key learnings from events including the Central Queensland Bushfires 2018, the North and Far North Queensland Monsoon and the 2019-20 Queensland Bushfires.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

CARPENTARIA MAKES AN EARLY START TO BUILD LOCAL CONFIDENCE

Due to significant rainfall and flooding from the North and Far North Queensland Monsoon Trough early in 2019, Carpentaria Shire was activated for the joint Commonwealth and State funded Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) for Counter Disaster Operations, Emergency Work and Restoration of Essential Public Assets, to restore damage after a significant hit to the shire.

Council identified an early gap in the programming of current works and worked with the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) to get works started as soon as it was safe to do so.

QRA worked closely with Council to enable the restoration of Iffley Road (approximately 60km south of Normanton) resulting in an extension to the construction season and delivering a muchneeded boost to local business confidence.

Following the devastating impact to the local economy from the 2019 flood event, the ability to support and extend business opportunities has kept people employed locally and significantly contributing to the stimulation of the shire's economy.

Giving businesses comfort in being able to continue work over this period has put them and the Shire in a greater fiscal position, maintained specialist skill sets locally and developed new local opportunities. Carpentaria Shire is in a more sustainable position coming into the 2020 construction season thanks to these works.

Council's Chief Executive Officer, Mark Crawley said the establishment of a major works program is a massive undertaking.



"Carpentaria Shire's roads provide access to a range of local tourist destinations and regional commercial centres so ensuring our residents and tourists are safe on the roads is an important consideration for our town. It is the backbone of what we do here at Council," Mr Crawley said.

"Taking into consideration Council looks after 64,000 square kilometres, the accelerated approval process to repair damage to the road network through QRA put the council in a better position to manage quality of work and performance outcomes.

"It has also provided workers and businesses a greater sense of security to be able to provide competitive rates.

"It is important we recognise the impact this funding has for rebuilding business sustainability and confidence in our shire," he said.

In addition to the 2019 reconstruction program, Carpentaria has now been activated through QRA for assistance measures following the recent Queensland Monsoonal Flooding in January 2020, with damage inspections underway to ensure the road network is in a trafficable state as soon as practicable.

Get Ready Queensland

GRQ provides Queensland Government funding for grants and community awareness campaigns to help local governments improve their communities' resilience.

Submissions are now open for the 2020 Resilient Australia Awards. The Resilient Australia Awards is a national program to recognise initiatives that strengthen community disaster resilience across six categories including community, school, business, local government, state/federal government and photography.

Since 2000, the awards have celebrated innovation and exemplary practice across Australia to inspire others to build greater disaster resilience in their local area. Get Ready Queensland is proud to be the state convenor for the Awards to help promote the excellent work local councils, community groups, schools and individuals do to prepare and protect communities across Queensland.

The GRQ team is currently trialling an app to use when visiting schools and other conventions to educate children and adults on how to prepare their household for natural disasters. The user plays through a series of nine levels, which get progressively harder.

Queensland Disaster Resilience Fund (QDRF) and Prepared Communities Fund

\$10.65M allocated to 73 projects for the 2018-19 round of the State-funded QDRF (\$9.5M, 62 projects) and

State-Commonwealth Prepared Communities Fund (\$1.15M, 11 projects). Applications for the 2019-20 allocation of resilience funding are expected to open in O2 2020.

Resilience projects and activities

Resilient Queensland 2018-2021: Delivering the Queensland Strategy for Disaster Resilience (QSDR)

Resilient Queensland in Action was released on 21 February 2020 as the progress update on delivering the first 18 months of Resilient Queensland, demonstrating how we are implementing the QSDR. It includes case studies and initiatives showcasing some of the great work happening throughout Queensland to improve disaster resilience. Planning is underway for release in February 2020.





Resilience projects and activities

North and Far North Queensland Monsoon Trough Cat D - Flood Mapping and Flood Warning Programs

The \$1 million Burdekin and Haughton Catchment Resilience Strategy Project will develop locally-led and regionally-coordinated resilience solutions to address recent and emerging disaster risks for councils in the catchment area including Townsville City Council. This project is currently underway and due for completion by end of 2020.

The \$2 million Flood Warning Infrastructure Network Project will analyse existing flood warning infrastructure, working with the Bureau of Meteorology and councils to identify high priority locations requiring additional flood warning infrastructure capability including repairs of and/or installation of new infrastructure. This project is underway in Townsville and surrounds, North West Queensland, Far North Queensland and Central West Queensland. Procurement has been finalised and delivery is underway for completion of the Network Optimisation Phase by end of March 2020.

The Townsville Recalibrated Flood Modelling and Mapping Project - supporting Townsville City Council to update and recalibrate flood modelling and mapping across the council area including the Ross River - is underway.

Brisbane River Strategic Floodplain Management Plan (SFMP)

QRA has oversight of 52 SFMP actions including 34 for State government, of which QRA is responsible for 12.



Resilience policy


